Training Description and Core Clinical Components:	<p>The purpose of this two-hour web training is to provide participants with an overview of medications that have been shown to be effective as a component of the treatment of opioid use disorders. Topics will include: the context for medication-assisted treatment (positive and negative perceptions), the epidemiology of opioid use disorders (user demographics), a review of various classes of opioids, an overview of each medication, its indication, to whom it is administered, and how it works, and treatment settings for medication-assisted treatment.</p>
Learning Objectives:	<p>At the end of the training, participants will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Describe at least three (3) acute and chronic effects of opioids. 2. Describe the prevalence of and key populations impacted by opioid use. 3. Provide examples of at least two (2) medications that are available to treat opioid use disorders. 4. List and explain at least two strategies that can be used to address health disparities through increased access to medication-assisted treatment.
